While proposals will be considered at any time of the year, we must receive applications before April 1 for consideration for the current year funding. It helps us visualize the project if you provide pictures or sketches of the existing conditions of the site. If you would like advice on what and when to plant, please feel free to contact the Peterborough and Area Master Gardeners at www.peterboroughgardens.ca or on their hotline at 705-741-4905. Fall is often a good time to put in some plant material because it often goes on sale and it will do well if planted after the heat of summer. You may wish to apply by the April 1 deadline but use the funds in the fall.

Preference will be given to projects:

- in which the funding covers plant material rather than hardscape.
- whose plant material is more permanent. Preference will be given for perennials, trees and shrubs over annuals. Native or hardy plants are often a good choice.
- that provide value to the largest number of people in the community.
- whose proposals most clearly demonstrate how the funds will be used for the benefit of the community.
- in which members of the community contribute their own time and/or resources.
