## Tips and Techniques

Winter is a tough time for our houseplants. They must contend with reduced light and humidity levels, overheated air and cold draughts. Is it little wonder that they drop their leaves or worse? Grouping your houseplants will make caring for them simpler.

They will probably need to be watered more frequently using water at room temperature. But be sure that the pot is not sitting in water so that the roots are waterlogged. You might tend to forget about your plants because they spend the winter in an area of the house where you do not go every day – out of sight, out of mind! You could resort to adding a note in your day planner to ensure that they are not gasping for their last breath when you finally remember.

To help increase humidity levels, mist frequently using tepid water. Another method is to sit the plants in a shallow tray that has a layer of small pebbles. The pebbles keep the pots above the water, which will raise the humidity levels as it evaporates. If the plants are grouped in one area, using a humidifier will help.

Placing your houseplants on a windowsill might take advantage of the available light but it will likely be too cold particularly if they are touching the glass. If the sill is wide enough, move the pots away from the window or place them on a table near the window.

The low light levels mean that most indoor plants will go dormant or die back. To increase the amount of available light use fluorescent bulbs. These are economical and readily available.

Check for pests regularly. Use insecticidal soap if necessary.

Late winter is a good time to re-pot root-bound plants. This will help to get them ready for the higher light levels as the days grow longer. Increase fertilization at this time.

## This Month in the Garden – November and December

### Peterborough & Area Master Gardeners

- ✓ Fertilize lawn.
- ✓ Make sure evergreens, shrubs and young trees are well watered for winter.
- ✓ Protect young trees from rodents.
- ✓ Plant some spring bulbs in pots for forcing.
- ✓ Store tools, hoses and other garden equipment and ornaments for the winter.
- ✓ Watch for bugs on houseplants (white flies, spider mites, and aphids).
- ✓ Protect rose bushes with plastic cones or by adding soil or compost just before the ground freezes.
- ✓ Apply mulch to tender perennials just as the ground starts to freeze.
- ✓ Protect pyramidal evergreens, rhododendrons and other shrubs using burlap screens.
- ✓ Cut branches for winter decorations.
- ✓ Order seed catalogues
